CALL TO ORDER

Council Chairman Erskine Oglesby, Jr. called the open meeting to order with a quorum present via electronic means that included Vice-Chairman Chip Henderson and Councilpersons Carol Berz, Anthony Byrd, Demetrus Coonrod, Russell Gilbert, Darrin Ledford, Jerry Mitchell and Ken Smith. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 13214, KNOWN AS "THE FISCAL YEAR 2017-2018 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT BUDGET ORDINANCE" SO AS TO APPROPRIATE \$500,000.00 FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CAPITAL FUND TO THE CHATTANOOGA AREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOR PROCESSING SMALL BUSINESS COVID-19 CORONAVIRUS BRIDGE-GRANTS.

Councilwoman Berz moved to approve, seconded by Councilman Gilbert. The motion carried unanimously (9-0) upon roll call vote. Due to the urgency of this ordinance and the requirement for two readings, **Vice-Chairman Henderson moved** that the Council would recess at the conclusion of tonight's business and reconvene at 10:00 a.m. tomorrow, April 8, 2020, in order to have a second reading of this legislation. He was seconded by Councilman Byrd. The motion carried unanimously (9-0) upon roll call vote.

RESOLUTION #30300

A RESOLUTION APPROVING SHORT TERM VACATION RENTAL APPLICATION NO. 19-STVR-00187 FOR PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1609 LONG STREET #102.

Charles Young, Assistant Director of Development at ECD, gave a presentation that included information on the following:

- Surrounding STVR Applications
- Exterior/aerial pics
- Other photos from street/parking
- Application History

Councilman Mitchell questioned Mr. Young's use of the words "*Opposition letters mailed out*" in his presentation. He requested that future presentations reflect "*Notification letters mailed out*," or similar wording. Mr. Young agreed. Vice-Chairman Henderson then recognized both the Applicant and members of the Opposition.

Applicant:

• Erin Spahn – When she looked into applying several months ago, she thought the building was at capacity, but someone sold one of the units, which brought the numbers down below the nine bedroom threshold. She applied afterwards. She allows two renters in her unit. She does not allow smoking. She has quiet hours between 10:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. She manages the property so far and has not had any issues with anyone. Her neighbor directly next door watches over the unit. Her parents have been operating in the front of the building for over a year and a half. There is plenty of parking in a private lot in the back. There is also street parking. She does not allow pets out of respect to her neighbors. Most of the units in this building are short-term rentals and have a high turn in sales.

Attorney Noblett requested to know for the record that this particular structure is not part of a portable housing PILOT. Ms. Spahn affirmed that this was not part of a portable housing PILOT.

Vice-Chairman Henderson confirmed that there was no opposition wishing to speak by electronic means. **Chairman Oglesby moved to approve**, seconded by Councilman Byrd. The motion carried unanimously (9-0) upon roll call vote.

Agenda Item VII(b):

A RESOLUTION APPROVING SHORT TERM VACATION RENTAL APPLICATION NO. 19-STVR-00184 FOR PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1420 MADISON STREET. Councilman Byrd informed the Council that no presentation was needed on this application. He explained that he is working with resident Jennifer Madison to organize a meeting with the Bryson Moore, the Applicant. Vice-Chairman Henderson opened the floor to hear from the Opposition that were present in this meeting.

Opposition:

Erica & Andrew McCallie – Ms. McCallie informed the Council of her letter of opposition and wanted to discuss two reasons for opposition: (1) it infringes on their right to peaceful enjoyment as a homeowners and (2) it does not contribute to the long-term vision laid out by the City of Chattanooga. She has recently had to file police reports at least three times due to noise. People she does not know fail to adhere to landscaping codes and misuse their private property. She had to install locks on her trash cans. The neighborhood is 33-percent STVRs, which is above the 1.8-percent city average there. Approval of this rental would make it 36-percent. She is a member of a multi-generational Chattanooga family that has a vested interest in this city. Short-term rentals take away opportunity for people to own homes and have affordable housing. She referenced a Pennsylvania Supreme Court decision from April 2019 that prohibited short-term rentals for single-family homes. She believes that a neighborhood being 30-percent short-term rentals is not acceptable.

Councilman Byrd spoke on the mixed opinions he has gotten from the community on STVRs and gave his phone number so that Ms. McCallie could call him tonight to discuss this matter. **Councilman Byrd moved to defer** one week to April 14, 2020. Councilman Gilbert seconded. The motion to defer carried unanimously (9-0) upon roll call vote.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING SHORT TERM VACATION RENTAL APPLICATION NO. 20-STVR-00001 FOR PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1721 W. 39TH STREET.

A hearing ensued. Mr. Young gave a presentation that included information on the following:

- Surrounding STVR Applications
- Street View Pics
- Application History

Vice-Chairman Henderson recognized the Applicant and members of the Opposition.

Applicant:

• Jill Green – She has been doing construction on this property for over 14 months. It was a very blighted property on the street. She has \$350,000 in the property now with the intention for it to be a short-term rental property. She knows that parking is an issue. There is parking for four and possibly six with the parking pad. She feels that the complaints about the road is an issue between the residents and the city, or a civil matter between the residents and GreenTech, which built many of the homes. She believes that most of the opposition purchased their homes into after the STVR zone was established, so they knew that there could be short-term rentals in that area. She has installed nest cameras and a noise detection device for security. She matches their driver's license and makes them sign a

contract during the check-in process. She wants to be a good neighbor and a good business person. She loves inviting people to St. Elmo. She is a super host who has been doing this for 15 years and has voluntarily completed a vacation lodging service course with the State of Tennessee.

Opposition:

- Art and Vickie Lewis They expressed safety concerns for their 6-year-old grandson and several children who live in the neighborhood. They argue that W. 39th Street is a fire lane. They described that delivery trucks and fire trucks have problems traveling on this road because it is so narrow.
- Calvin Lewis He lives across the street from this property and heard that the parking pad belongs to GreenTech, not the Applicant. There are problems with people parking on the street. He believes STVRs lower the property values in the neighborhood. He was living in this neighborhood 12 years before STVRs happened in this city. He is especially opposed to non-owner occupied STVRs.
- Chelsea Kepheart She lives across the street from this property and does not consider the Applicant to be a "good neighbor" because she has ever met the Applicant. When she moved into her home, she was told that she could use the parking pad.
- **Ben Grady** He lives around the corner from this property. He believes the percentage of STVR in this neighborhood is too high, especially non-owner occupied ones. He considers noise to be a problem and disagrees that the yard is maintained at this property.

Chairman Oglesby moved to defer one week to April 14, 2020, so that he can speak with Ms. Green and others in opposition that were not able to speak at tonight's meeting. Councilwoman Berz seconded. The motion carried unanimously (9-0) upon roll call vote.

ACTION: DEFERRED TO APRIL 14, 2020

PROCEDURAL NOTE: Vice-Chairman Henderson yielded the chair of the meeting back to Chairman Oglesby at this time.
