# Public Comments to City Council Janice Gooden, District 8 8/4/2020

Re: Councilwoman Coonrod's request to hear from Black residents

A couple of weeks ago, Councilwoman Coonrod stated that the council was not hearing from black people. While some of us have spoken, others have expressed a distrust of engaging in this format because they feel no consideration will be given or decisions have already been made. There should be a willingness to consider new ideas and make changes when needed.

In light of recent calls for changes in budget allocations in terms of police funding, I support the idea of utilizing the skills of social workers and mental health professionals in staff or contracted positions. Upon review of existing policies, those that would perpetuate racism or police brutality should be eliminated.

There needs to be a reevaluation of all policies and programs in every department to determine if they are effective. 1) Funding and/or staffing adjustments should be made when needed. 2) Any barriers to citizens' access to services should be identified and eliminated. 3) There should be a balance in funding for services and maintaining safe and accessible facilities.

We cannot ignore, the impact that "Black on Black" crime has on our community. We know there are different theories why it exists but we need to move toward finding real solutions. Consider: 1)Preventive measures-mentoring and counseling services through YFD centers in cooperation with schools, churches and non-profits. 2) Focus on initiatives to eliminate prevalence of violence(including with the use of weapons) and participation in gang activity. 3) Opportunities for job training and employment with livable wages. 4)Prison reform with transitional programs to support those committed to rebuilding their lives.

Other needs include: 1)Adequate transportation throughout the city and surrounding areas. 2)Elimination of food deserts. 3) Safe streets for pedestrians and bikers. 4) Preserving historic neighborhoods with funding to assist families and seniors with maintaining and restoring older homes.

With all of the expertise and resources in our city, change can happen. Commitment to the process is the first step.
